2 Chair's report

It's been a hectic year! Challenge and change have been the themes as the third sector copes with both financial and governance challenges, as well as the prospect of change in our relationship with the Welsh Government.

This 'refreshing of the relationship between the Welsh Government and the third sector' as set out in *Continuity and change*, the Welsh Government's consultation document, has prompted much discussion and debate throughout the year, and whilst this will provide opportunities for improvement, it brings


with it the inevitable uncertainties tied up with change.

Another wider challenge with implications for the third sector coming strongly to the fore during the year has been the recognition that public services will need to be delivered in different ways if they are to be sustainable. Co-production as a theme for the future of some public services has been put on the agenda by the WCVA and others.

In the meantime, despite the challenges and uncertainty, I would like to thank all those who promote and take part in these activities from all our member organisations - large and small throughout Wales, the CVCs, and the staff of WCVA. It's so important that our sector works together in these difficult times to fly the flag for volunteers and voluntary organisations, and celebrate their achievements.

3 Looking back and looking forward

Our chief executive, Graham Benfield OBE, takes time out to reflect on a challenging year for the third sector in Wales, and ponder what the future has in store.



How would you reflect on the last 12 months?

There's no doubt it's been a challenging time for the sector. There have been financial challenges around funding which have affected many organisations, including WCVA. There has also been pressure on the sector to respond to some of the governance crises of the previous year.

How would you sum up the last year for WCVA? What are the key things we've been saying and doing?

We've been able to reflect on the culmination of many of the programmes we've developed over the last few years. Our Gateway programme has provided access to European Structural Funds for over 700 third sector projects. Through the access and support we have provided, thousands of people have benefited and the sector has been able to play its part in ways that would otherwise not have been possible.

We've helped over 1,000 people into jobs and work placements through our employability and internship programmes. Almost 500 community groups accessed funding through our grant schemes and our information sheets have been accessed over 600,000 times.

We've also been able to clarify and develop our messages about the sort of society and public service that we want to create. There is now a clear narrative and vision for the future in terms of the sector's role.

How would you describe the funding landscape and what are the key financial challenges?

We have to put funding in proportion. There are around 33,000 organisations in Wales; most of them are small, community-based and totally self sustaining and self funding.

Some larger scale organisations rely on a degree of governmental support and that is becoming more difficult. Charity retail will continue to be significant in the future and it will be vital that organisations develop new income streams and enterprise to safeguard their services.

It's important to point out that the sector remains extraordinarily good value. Only two per cent of Welsh Government funds are spent on the third sector in Wales and 90 per cent of WCVA funds come in and go straight back out to hundreds of organisations the length and breadth of Wales.

Social finance is emerging and WCVA is playing a lead role. How do you see this evolving?

I think we need a mix of funding at all times and to look to where we can develop new forms of funding. Social finance is not a panacea but organisations both old and new do need to think in imaginative ways about how they can fund their work.

We have developed a finance portfolio in the last year where organisations can access £1,000 through to £5 million and everything in between, so the potential for innovation and replication is excellent.

What are your hopes for the next round of European Structural Funds?

The programmes must get off to a good start by building on what has worked well previously. It's vital that we create an economic legacy and that's why we want to see more investment in loans and recyclable finance which can continue to have an impact for years to come.

We also want the programmes to be accessible to a range of organisations, large and small, because some of the best work that's been done in communities on employment and tackling poverty has been done at a very local level.

With poverty on the increase and welfare reform and austerity set to continue, how is the role of the third sector evolving in Wales?

I think the role of the sector is more critical than ever. Most of our

33,000 organisations are working with people in need or people experiencing greater challenges as a result of changes that have taken place. In-work poverty is also on the increase.

Quality of life and wellbeing is incredibly dependent on having a strong community and vibrant local organisations – not just to support people, but also to enable them to feel valued and contribute to their own communities.

A lot has been said about a 'coproduction' approach offering a more sustainable vision for public services in Wales. What are your thoughts on this?

Co-production places greater emphasis on early, communitybased support and a preventative approach which will ultimately reduce pressure on more expensive, acute public services.

We believe that this will be the future of sustainable public services. We need to value people and communities as assets and give them a sense of ownership over the services they receive in their communities.

A year on from the demise of AWEMA, how has the debate around governance and grant management moved on?

The support available from WCVA to improve governance has been widely taken up. I also think that grant-givers have acknowledged that their practice needs to improve and they have set about doing that.

So the combination of both these things is ensuring that a stronger and more diligent governance culture is developing in Wales.

You said in last year's impact report that there is greater appetite for collaboration in the sector. What has been the experience 12 months on?

We have seen an acceleration in both collaboration and merger in the sector over the last year.

The tendering market has become extremely competitive and while there is certainly a greater appetite for collaboration in this regard, it's likely that this will need to increase in speed and scale for the sector to flourish in this market.

Has volunteering and the creation of volunteer opportunities taken on greater significance?

We're seeing new and different forms of volunteering emerge including time-banking, street ambassadors and volunteering in the education system. People are volunteering to enhance their labour prospects, learn new skills, and to have a more fulfilling life.

It's important that volunteering continues to be supported and championed, because the link between volunteering and a healthier, happier society is proven.

How will third sector organisations need to adapt in order to flourish over the coming years?

Organisations will continually need to look at new and different ways to achieve their objectives. This will mean using new technologies and ensuring that they are using and attracting every resource that they can.

Being adaptable and determined in an environment with increasing demands and uncertainties over resources are qualities that will see organisations flourish.

What will WCVA's role be in supporting that?

Our role will be to set out a clear pathway and vision for the third sector in Wales. Taking forward a co-production approach to public services will be central to that.

We will need to defend the sector's independence and take up issues where it disagrees with government – as we did this year, most notably, on charity shops in Wales.

I think it's about us constantly updating our services to reflect emerging technology and trends. It's also about continuing to open up opportunities for the sector to achieve its own objectives, be that through the design and delivery of services, or in scrutinising how decisions are made.

The Welsh Government is consulting on its relationship with the third sector at the moment. What would you like to see come out of this consultation?

I would like to see a stronger relationship built around a greater understanding and awareness of the issues where government and the sector can work together. There also needs to be a greater determination to maximise the added value that comes from pursuing a common agenda. Defining and articulating that common ground will be absolutely key.

4 Supporting the sector

In the last year we supported thousands of organisations. Every day our staff are providing information, advice and guidance which is helping the sector support thousands of people who rely on its services.

Our new website is an integrated, multi-media showcase for the third sector in Wales. Our free governance 'health-check' is strengthening the governance culture within hundreds of organisations. And our programme of training, conferences and events are connecting people in the sector with the latest thinking on emerging issues while helping them find fresh ways to develop their organisations.

Informing, advising, supporting

We offer information and support to the third sector in countless different ways. Groups can access information from our authoritative Helpdesk service, which offers advice on all sorts of subjects, our new website and weekly newsletters for members, and our suite of social media pages, an increasingly popular way for people to engage with us. team, Legal Services Officer or Criminal Records Unit, while our training service continues to go from strength to strength, with some new courses already proving popular.

Over 3,000 members and thousands of other organisations and individuals use our information services regularly. We're proud of the depth, breadth and quality of the service we offer.

Our funding conference: making an impact on fundraisers



Our 2012 funding conference – First off the blocks: how to get ahead in funding your future – was a resounding success.

The event focused on how sector groups could be successful in their funding efforts. Speakers such as Angela Hughes of Wales Air Ambulance and Sir Adrian Webb, Wales Chair of the Big Lottery Fund attracted nearly 200 people to Venue Cymru in Llandudno. Also on offer was an array of over 20 workshops, examining topics from tendering and



social investment to project **mediates** planning, making money go further and successful corporate partnerships.

The feedback received was overwhelmingly positive, including comments such as 'inspiring and informative', 'excellent speakers, I thoroughly enjoyed all three', 'a great range and topics of workshops' and 'an ideal location and a very informative programme, well advertised and attended'.

Achievements this year include:

- Attracting over 375,000 visitors to our website.
- Responding to over 10,400 enquiries on our Helpdesk.
- Launching our new e-newsletter for members covering news across eight topics. Over 3,000 sector members receive it weekly.
- Over 5,600 people follow/like/favourite us across Twitter, Facebook, LinkedIn, Pinterest and our other social media sites. Projects such as Participation Cymru and Wales Africa Community Links reach several hundred others through their own social media sites.
- Maintaining a suite of 12 affinity scheme providers who offer discounted goods and services to our members – adding employment advice from Hugh James Employment and HR Services Group and Unity Trust Bank's Property Loan Fund to the list this year.
- Publishing 21 issues of Network Wales magazine and 50 editions of Network Jobs magazine.
- Publishing 12 editions of our national supplement for CVCs.
- Four People and Places funding application training sessions took place, including a webinar.
- Attracting a total of 670 attendees to our programme of five major conferences.
- Our Legal Services Officer responded to 226 enquiries from the sector.
- Advertising 347 vacancies on www.recruit3.org.uk, the sector recruitment site run by ourselves and the Big Issue Cymru.
- Attracting over 350 nominations to our award schemes and other award schemes that WCVA supports.

Website branches out

Our new website, which has brought together all our information, social media and news services, has proved very popular with members and the sector.

Each week, *WCVA update* is produced, giving our 3,000 plus members a bespoke news service across eight topics, in either Welsh or English.

We are keen to make sure that we use our new website as effectively as possible to raise the profile of our policy and influencing work. This means using the website to highlight our policy priorities and our consultations, briefings and responses along with marketing our conferences, events and training and our membership services.

Achievements this year include:

- 41 Communities First training courses took place, training 549 learners who gave their courses a 94 per cent average satisfaction rate.
- The People and Places training scheme hosted our first ever webinar.
- Providing a wide range of training to organisations involved in European funding: 16 courses for 161 learners.
- Delivering 115 courses for 1,258 learners; of these courses, 20 were accredited.
- 206 participants have completed between one and six training modules that Wales Africa Community Links are commissioned to run on behalf of the Wales International Development Hub.
- Supporting CVCs to run a core training programme: 788 courses for 7,695 learners.

Training

We run a range of courses and are the sector's main provider of training. We continue to encourage the sector to invest in training and learning for staff, volunteers and trustees.

Our 'finding funding' suite of courses help groups face the future

The Gaer Community Network is a community centre providing opportunities for local people in Newport through projects such as job clubs and a youth forum.

However, the organisation faced reductions in funding and, having been very reliant on grants, knew they had to change in order to survive. In order to develop a sustainability plan, they contacted Sustainable Funding Cymru.

'The courses themselves really helped us decide what direction to take,' said Jane Weale of Gaer Community Network. They helped us understand the avenues of sustainability we could look for. It wasn't just about funding, it broadened our horizons.'

The Better Bids project supported the Network in applying for Lottery funding. 'It was my first time writing a Big Lottery bid,' said Jane, 'and it was quite daunting so to get support was great for me. We had an advisor who was absolutely brilliant and



really supportive. He helped us with getting the outcomes right and understand how to write the targets properly.'

Since their training and successful Lottery funding application, the Network has set up a childcare social enterprise and a coffee shop, both helping them become more sustainable. They aim to set up a minimum of two other social enterprises, including possibly a gardening service.

'There's a really positive vibe from everyone in the centre now to help take all this forward. Everybody who comes in gets involved,' said Jane.

Supporting Communities First

WCVA has provided support to Communities First since 2009, over two contracts. In February this year, we were awarded the contract for the next two years.

Here is an extract from Welsh Government's *The evaluation* of Communities First – technical appendix:

The feedback provided on the relevance, quality and timeliness of the WCVA advice and support was very positive with at least 90 per cent (ie, 70 of 78 respondents) rating each of these three aspects of the WCVA support as being either 'good' or 'very good'.

 Nearly all of the surveyed respondents rated the training that they had received from WCVA as being either 'very good' or 'good' in terms of its relevance and quality. Of these, many commented upon the positive aspects of the training received – for example: 'training for partnership members was very good and relevant to their needs'.

Making the most of the Learning Zone

Sustainable Funding Cymru's Learning Zone offers the sector the chance to learn online about funding and finance, with courses covering grants, contracts, trading and more.

Sarah Breeze-Roberts, Fundraising Officer at RSPB Cymru, is among those who have taken Learning Zone courses this year. Here, she tells us how the Learning Zone benefited her organisation.

'I signed up for the Learning Zone courses as I was looking at improving my knowledge and skill of fundraising. Being able to sign up and "attend" the courses online enabled me to take advantage of flexible learning and knowledge transfer from the comfort of my office desk and at my own speed also.

I signed up and benefited from four courses - *Getting fit for grant funding, Finding the right funding mix, Writing winning funding bids* and *To bid or not to bid*. I learnt a great deal, such as the difference between outcomes and objectives, and it made me much more focused in my job as a Fundraiser - when setting objectives and outcomes, for example.

Some of the courses also helped reassure me that I was on the right track and gave me confidence in my role on a daily basis. They are full of valuable information which I have saved to enable me to use on a weekly basis

I believe the courses have benefited RSPB Cymru as I am a more confident in my role and more assertive when setting outcomes, aims, and objectives when applying for funding. The courses have enabled me to assess my skills, which I believe will benefit RSPB Cymru in applications to trusts and grant providers. I have also become more organised and more focused on what is important to funders, therefore more likely to succeed in gaining funding for RSPB Cymru.

I will definitely be signing up to other courses within the Learning Zone in the future.'

Trustees and governance

We have continued to underpin and promote high standards of governance in the sector. Our flagship publications *Faith and hope don't run charities (trustees do)* and *Good governance – a code for the third sector in Wales,* plus our *Governance health check* are all now available on a handy USB stick. The Governance health check has been well received and widely used in the sector – including by WCVA's own trustees!



Our new website has a dedicated section on trustees and governance, and this is regularly refreshed with new items included in the weekly electronic *WCVA update*. The programme of trustee events, including the annual charity law conference in association with charity law experts Geldards, has attracted over 300 participants on subjects including *Responsibilities when employing staff, Fundraising – getting the most from your Board*, and *Tendering for trustees*.

> Tracey Downes of Penarth Youth Project attended a *Tendering for Trustees* event, facilitated by a WCVA member of staff, and this is what she said about it:

'I completed my evaluation form last evening, but felt that I also needed to email and express my sincere thanks for such an informative evening on the tendering process.

It certainly put everything into perspective as well as into plain language, that I now feel I am able to approach the process with foresight and knowledge. Your delivery and content were both excellent, you answered all questions asked, allowing people in the room the opportunity to share their experiences and ask questions of each other. A great facilitator, and this is not just my view but a view that was shared by others'.



Paul Frost, one of our Wales Volunteer of the Year trustee winners, helped establish the North West Wales Outdoor Partnership at Plas y Brenin in 2004. The outdoor activities programme has seen more than 25,000 local people taking part in events over the past seven years.

Paul helped produce the original strategy and work programme for the new organisation, to secure the support of partners and funding from Welsh Government, Sport Wales and the local authorities to employ members of staff. He now chairs the organisation.

5 Volunteering – at the heart of the sector

One of our key objectives is to support volunteers and volunteering. One of the highlights this year was the re-launch of our volunteering website www.volunteering-wales.net, which helps to bring people seeking volunteering opportunities and organisations together. And our groundbreaking, two-day digital volunteering conference, presented jointly with Communities 2.0, attracted over 110 delegates and had very positive feedback.

Our 2013 *Third sector statistical resource* showed that nearly 200 million hours of voluntary effort is given each year by over 978,000 people in Wales.

Our flagship Volunteering in Wales Fund grant seeks to fund organisations to recruit volunteers from the underrepresented sectors of the population such as those aged 50 years plus, people with disabilities, and people unemployed in rural and urban areas.

We have also provided funding for projects involving young people through the Millennium Volunteers and GwirVol schemes.

Grant funds conservation charity to monitor Welsh sea life

The national marine research and conservation charity, Sea Watch Foundation, received funding from WCVA's Volunteering in Wales Fund, to appoint Katrin Lohrengel as its Welsh Development Officer.

The coast around Wales is one of the most important in the UK for cetaceans- whales, dolphins and porpoises. It is home to populations of bottlenose dolphins and harbour porpoises, and is regularly used by Risso's dolphins, common dolphins, minke whales and fin whales.

Katrin will be heading up a Welsh Sea Watchers project by developing a network of volunteers trained to carry out regular land-based surveys at points along the north, west and south coasts of Wales.

She will also be creating a team of Sea Watch lecturers who can go into primary and secondary schools to raise awareness of the Welsh coast's importance for marine wildlife, and to inspire youngsters to consider careers in marine sciences.



Katrin has been Sea Watch's volunteer regional sightings co-ordinator for North West England for two years, and the grant has enabled her to move into the paid role.

Sea Watch Sightings Officer Danielle Gibas said: 'Eco tourism already plays an important role in the Welsh economy, and we hope that by raising the profile of the Welsh marine wildlife we will encourage more people to become actively involved in many aspects of conservation and scientific research.'

Achievements this year include:

- Maintaining and developing, with volunteer centres, a suite of volunteering information sheets on working with volunteers
- Maintaining and retaining the www.volunteering-wales.net website's position as the top volunteering website on Google when searching for 'volunteer in Wales', advertising nearly 6,000 volunteering opportunities and attracting nearly 270,000 visitors
- Promoting good practice in the management of volunteers through the Investing in Volunteers programme
- Organising a national volunteering awards scheme

Fund allows charity to reach out to those suffering bullying

Bullies Out, an anti-bullying charity set up in 2006, secured £22,302 from the Volunteering in Wales Fund in 2012-13 for their Reaching Out project.

In total 64 volunteers, contributing 4,000 volunteering hours, were recruited by the organisation in Bridgend, Neath Port Talbot, Swansea and Rhondda Cynon Taff.

Volunteers were either trained to deliver workshops to children and young people in schools or youth clubs, or as Young



Ambassadors who are the public face of anti-bullying work in schools and communities.

The funding allowed the organisation to significantly increase its volunteer base through employing a Volunteer Co-ordinator – the organisation's first ever paid employee.

Volunteering 'gave me confidence', says Jessica

Jessica is a young person who has been volunteering in the volunteer centre at the Association of Voluntary Organisations in Wrexham (AVOW) since January this year.

'When I first met Lisa at AVOW I told her that I enjoyed being on social network sites,' Jessica said, 'so this is what I do for her project. I keep her BIG Volunteering project Facebook page up to date by adding photos and updates. I also help her with some filing and small admin tasks.

'I got involved to improve my confidence. I am very shy and nervous around people so I thought that by pushing myself to do a little bit of volunteering would help with this and I could try something different with new people other than my family.'

'Lisa has made it easy for me and has helped me all along. She also texts me and emails me a lot so I have got to know her and feel comfortable.

'Lisa has helped me do a college application form for a Beauty and Nails course which I would like to do as it will hopefully help me get a job in the future as this is something I enjoy doing in my spare time at the moment.'

Jessica has also been supported to find a suitable volunteering opportunity through the BIG Wales volunteering project.

New volunteering websites

Volunteering Wales relaunches

In January 2013, Volunteering Wales launched its new website, allowing people to find volunteering opportunities in their local area. Volunteering Wales, a partnership between WCVA and local volunteer centres, aims to link volunteers with organisations



across Wales. The website is populated with opportunities in every local authority area in Wales.

Opportunities are searchable by location, age group, language preference, where out-of-pocket expenses are paid, where public transport is nearby and where training is provided.

Organisations who involve volunteers in their work can advertise their volunteering opportunities and can now also add their opportunities directly to the website when they are recruiting volunteers, making this process much quicker and easier.

GwirVol gets young people involved in new site

This year, GwirVol – the youth volunteering initiative for Wales – also relaunched its website, shortly after receiving its two millionth visitor. The new site offers young people and youth volunteering organisations their own profile and the chance to provide content for the site.



Users can submit news and events and comment on articles posted. They can also publish their own

stories so others can learn from their experience. The website also gives more young people access to the Millennium Volunteers (MV) Award, which recognises the time young people give to volunteering by giving them 50 and 100 hour certificates. It also integrates Gwirvol's social media networks.

Achievements this year include:

- Providing access to criminal records checks for volunteers and staff of voluntary organisations, handling 18,000 disclosure requests and keeping voluntary organisations up to date on changes to vetting and safeguarding arrangements
- Organising the annual Wales volunteering conference
- Through GwirVol, the youth volunteering partnership facilitated by WCVA, providing grants totalling nearly £800,000 to 105 projects that planned to involve over 4,300 young volunteers.
- Developing the GwirVol website www.gwirvol.org, the youth volunteering portal
- Supporting nearly 1,500 young people who received a Millennium Volunteer certificate for over 50 hours of volunteering
- Supporting the recruitment and training of over 2,700 newly recruited volunteers through the Volunteering in Wales Fund, contributing nearly 176,000 volunteering hours for the benefit of their communities
- Wales Africa Community Link visits involved 136 exchange participants, 1,928 Welsh and 1,668 African volunteers, and 21,419 supporters in Wales

GwirVol's successful year

In 2012-2013, Gwirvol's Millennium Volunteers Award continued to go from strength to strength. In total, over 2,750 MV certificates were claimed by volunteers in Wales, meaning that there have now been over 18,000 Millennium Volunteers in Wales since the programme launched.

The MV50 Sport scheme, part of the legacy of the London 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games, continues to grow and over 500 certificates have been issued for volunteering completed in sport in Wales. Overall more than 45,000 hours have been given by volunteers in Wales to support sport and physical activity. MV50 Sport is run in partnership with Sport Wales, Sport Leaders UK and StreetGames.

In 2012-13, the first MV50 Global certificates were issued. A GwirVol partner, UNA Exchange, ran a pilot programme whereby volunteers from Wales who gave their time to volunteer abroad could be recognised as part of the MV programme. Following a successful pilot and the award of the certificates for it in November, the scheme has been rolled out across Wales and will continue to grow in 2013-14.



GwirVol grants also had a successful year with 223 projects receiving funding, 59 through national grants and 164 through local youth led grants. The national grants resulted in 141,981 hours of volunteering and through the grants, the MV programme and the Youth Volunteering Advisers, 6,737 young people were placed as volunteers in 2012-2013.

Investing in Volunteers goes from strength to strength

Nine organisations achieved the IiV (Investing in Volunteers) standard in 2012-13 with four renewing their accreditation.

Barnardo's Cymru has become one of the latest and largest organisations in Wales to have achieved the liV Award. Barnardo's Cymru Children Services was assessed against a range of best practice standards and proved to excel in all aspects of working with its volunteers.

The children's charity has over 100 volunteers helping out at over 80 services for children, young people and their families across Wales. These volunteers help disabled children, young carers, families who are struggling to cope, young homeless people and children who have been sexually exploited.

Melanie Andrews (pictured right), Barnardo's Cymru Volunteering Advisor, said: 'We are proud to achieve this award and to receive the recognition of the hard work and dedication that takes place in our Children's Services across communities in Wales.



'Our volunteers make an enormous impact on how we work with children and young people and in doing so enables us to be a better organisation. This award demonstrates our commitment to our volunteers; we want their journey with Barnardo's Cymru to be as positive and as meaningful as it can be.'



6 Resourcing the sector

During the year, we've managed millions of pounds in grants, contracts and loans on behalf of a range of funders. Over £19 million to be precise.

This means that at the end of the 2012-13 financial year, we have awarded a quarter of a *billion* pounds – \pounds 250 million – to the sector since 2000. Tens of thousands of voluntary organisations the length and breadth of Wales have benefited.

Our grants are reaching small groups that play a big role in their communities. We're funding larger organisations to use their specialisms to deliver major government programmes. And we're providing loan finance that would otherwise be out-of-reach to help emerging enterprises grow.

Investment fund helps arts centre expand

Finance through our Communities Investment Fund has helped a not-for-profit arts centre in West Wales increase its turnover, expand its workforce and develop a new digital screen cinema.

Theatr Mwldan in Cardigan began life as a community theatre project in the 1980s and has since transformed itself into an award-winning arts and entertainment complex.

After securing loan funding from the Communities Investment Fund, Mwldan developed a new 101-seat digital cinema that opened its doors in 2012.

Six months after opening the new cinema, Mwldan had boosted its sales by 37.9 per cent, created three new jobs and is on course to increase its cinema screenings by 1,000 to 3,000 annually in addition to its programme of live events and exhibitions. The new screen - Mwldan 3 – is equipped with high quality digital projection and can present live satellite broadcasts and digital 3D.

It was developed alongside the venue's two existing screens to make Mwldan the first independent alldigital three-screen cinema in Wales.

Dilwyn Davies, Chief Executive at Mwldan, said: 'This has been a fantastic development which is providing the local community with a significantly improved choice of titles, more films on their national release dates, and an experience featuring the very latest in digital cinema technology.

'As a not-for-profit enterprise, every penny we earn is ploughed back into the organisation, ensuring that the venue, and in turn Cardigan, remains well and truly on the map as a leading cultural destination and hub for West Wales.'

At the forefront of social finance

After striking up new partnerships with Unity Trust Bank and Finance Wales, we are breaking new ground in the emerging field of social investment.

The Communities Investment Fund was the first social investment fund of its kind in Wales and has been investing loan finance of between £20,000 and £250,000 into third sector enterprise since 2006.

During the last year, we have added new packages with Unity Trust Bank and Finance Wales to a portfolio where organisations can now access finance ranging from £1,000 to £5 million and everything in between.

Rhondda-based charity Valleys Kids has used the Property Loan Fund with Unity Trust Bank to re-finance their purchase of The Pop Factory in Porth (pictured right) and help develop a residential centre for young people on the Gower.

Grant panels

We are grateful to the range of independent experts drawn from the third sector in Wales that make up our grant panels and ensure that funding decisions are made with probity, integrity and diligence.

The commitment of our panel members is ensuring excellent governance of our grants and that funding for the third sector in Wales is managed within the third sector in Wales.



During the year, Environment Wales grant panel member Alan Underwood stood down. We are very grateful for the expertise he shared with us.



This year marked the fifth birthday of the Wales Africa Community Links programme, which has so far secured and dispersed £445,677 to 202 projects. In October 2012, Archbishop Emeritus Desmond Tutu came to Wales to visit organisations in Cardiff, Pontypridd and Penygraig undertaking linking projects with South Africa, Lesotho, Zimbabwe, Swaziland and Uganda.

Careers in sport for North Wales youngsters



Funding through our Jobs Growth Wales programme has enabled a Flint-based social enterprise to create two new roles designed to help the organisation develop further opportunities in sport for young people in North Wales.

Us Unltd has employed Shane Poynton and Jamie Jones to develop partnerships with football clubs in the region to provide work placements where young people can learn about the business side of sport and achieve a qualification in sports industries.

They are also working in partnership with Street Football Wales to create street football opportunities for young people affected by homelessness that can lead to North Wales representation at future Homeless World Cups.

Shane, who has previously been affected by homelessness, said: 'First and foremost we want to create opportunities to get young people out of hostels, playing sport and improving their health and wellbeing.

'Creating leisure and sporting opportunities for people affected by homelessness is effective in terms of helping motivate them to get their lives back on track. Ultimately we want to create the pathway for some people from North Wales to take part in the Homeless World Cup next year.' Both Shane and Jamie had themselves been unemployed before their jobs were created by Us Unltd through the third sector strand of the Jobs Growth Wales programme.

'My previous job ended and for three or four months I was out of work and there wasn't much out there', said Shane, 21, from Deeside.

'I was actually part of the group which set up Us Unltd and have been a volunteer here for a few years so to be able to make a difference as a member of staff and earn a wage through it is absolutely brilliant for me.'

University graduate Jamie, 25, from Wrexham, had been looking for work since returning home from teaching abroad in the summer.

'Jobs as interesting as this and career opportunities in sports development barely exist nowadays - certainly not in this area, anyway.

'This has broadened my horizons, taken me out of my comfort zone and given me a lot of varied experience and skills that will make a big difference to my prospects.

'It's been pretty life-changing for me and hopefully our legacy will be the creation of more learning, leisure and work opportunities for young people in the area.'

Pembroke makes a difference!

Over 600 people in Pembrokeshire reduced their carbon emissions by a third of a ton after getting involved in a project funded by Environment Wales.

Environment Wales is a partnership of third sector organisations, administrated by WCVA, and its Supporting Sustainable Living grant scheme is helping to create changes in behaviour and lifestyle to reduce Wales' carbon footprint.

With DEFRA estimating that up to 20 per cent of UK greenhouse gas emissions relate to food 'from plot to plate', the Pembroke Can Make a Difference food project received a grant last year to change behaviour in relation to growing, purchasing and eating local and seasonal food.

The project looked to address some of the barriers to buying and growing local food that had been identified in a previous study, including accessibility and availability within retailers and perceptions regarding convenience and price.

A website was then developed where retailers and consumers could interact alongside other marketing initiatives including a Local Food logo and loyalty card, while the project also worked with the local Farmers Market to promote the social aspects of market shopping.

A container garden was created with the help of volunteers to show that it can be easy and fun to grow food in a small space and 'low carbon cookoff' events and cookery demonstrations were held to promote local, seasonal produce.

In total, 626 people participated in the project and results from before-and-after questionnaires and statistical evaluation indicate that the project contributed to an average reduction in the carbon emissions of respondents of 0.3 tonnes per person – or a 3 per cent reduction in the average UK carbon footprint.

There were also further benefits to health, resilience and the local economy brought about by people moving to a more sustainable local diet.

Concept gains European recognition

Our work around employability was recognised by a European institution at an international event in Brussels this year.

After making a nomination to the REVES Excellence Award 2013, we were one of 25 organisations from across Europe – and the only Welsh organisation – to make the final cut and be invited to present at the event.

REVES is the European network of cities and regions for the social economy, and guests from a range of European institutions, including the European Parliament, were present to hear examples of projects and partnership working from across Europe.

Our successful nomination centred on the intermediate labour market (ILM) concept which

originated in North West Wales in 2000 and has since developed into a national project that has been mainstreamed into Welsh Government policy for tackling unemployment through the Jobs Growth Wales programme.



In that time, over 5,000 people have been helped back into work, including people from the most challenging circumstances of economic inactivity and young people at most risk from the current economic conditions.

7 Representing the sector

We have continued to seek opportunities to influence policy in Wales, by representing the sector's views and promoting policies and ideas that create opportunities for third sector and community engagement. This year we have developed our thinking on coproduction, which we believe should be placed at the heart of future public service design and delivery.

Tackling poverty

We believe that the third sector has a unique role to play in developing anti-poverty programmes, and have been working to use the sector's experience in policy and practice to influence Welsh Government's Tackling Poverty Action Plan and strengthen the priority given to antipoverty and social inclusion through European Programmes.

Wales Africa helps tackle global hunger

Wales Africa Community Links helped spearhead a unique campaign against global hunger, which launched in Wales in January 2013.

The Enough Food for Everyone IF campaign was formed by a coalition of over 100 civil society organisations, including Wales Africa Community Links, which warned that almost a billion young people will be in poverty worldwide by 2025 – despite the fact that we live in a world with enough food for all.

The campaign launched at Cardiff Castle in January 2013, with events in Bangor and Wrexham the next day, and called on UK Prime Minister David Cameron to use the G8 presidency and the Summit in Enniskillen later that year to take action on the root causes of the hunger crisis in the poorest countries, land rights for poor farmers, investment of appropriate aid, prevention of tax dodging, and transparency in the food system.

The Welsh Government were also asked to play their part through supporting Fair Trade and environmental sustainability.

Other members of the IF campaign in Wales include CAFOD, Christian Aid, Fairtrade Wales, Oxfam Cymru and Save the Children.



This year we have:

- Established the Third Sector Anti Poverty Programmes Taskforce in partnership with leading third sector networks and organisations, providing a focus for coordinating activities and supporting the sector to work strategically.
- Developed proposals to proactively influence policy and delivery of the Welsh Government's Tackling Poverty Action Plan and align this as far as possible with the objectives of European Cohesion Policy 2014-2020 to maximize Structural Funds in relation to key department programmes.
- The Wales Africa Community Links programme facilitated 136 people to participate in knowledge and learning exchanges between Welsh and African organisations, and focused on sharing ideas and community solutions to the Millennium Development Goals for grassroots poverty reduction.
- In partnership with the Bevan Foundation, hosted a major conference, Hard times ahead meeting the challenges of poverty in 21st Century Wales.
- Published a policy paper, The poverty challenge - and the role of the third sector, outlining the various innovative ways in which we believe the sector is working to tackle poverty.



Working with government

The Third Sector Partnership Council continues to provide the essential lead partnership for support and development of the third sector. At the end of the year the Welsh Government announced its intention to refresh its relationship with the third sector, and followed this up in its *Continuity and change* consultation document.

This is the first major review of the relationship since 2007, and the conclusions will lay the foundations for future joint working at a critical time for public services in Wales, and for the Welsh Government's commitment to supporting the sector.

WCVA ended the year developing and consulting on its response. This encourages the Welsh Government to embrace co-production, emphasising the role that the sector plays in the design and delivery of public services, and how the infrastructure supports the sector in this. It considers the future support needs of the sector, and the importance of responding to the growing use of digital technologies to improve and widen access to services.

We look forward to the Welsh Government's conclusions, and hope that these will help shape a joint agenda that we can pursue together through the Third Sector Partnership Council, ministerial meetings and other mechanisms for joint working.

Participation Cymru works with the Citizens' Panel for Social Services in Wales

Over the last year Participation Cymru (PC) was privileged to be commissioned by the Deputy Minister for Children and Social Services to recruit and support members for a National Citizens' Panel in Wales.

This work included people who currently use Social Services, carers and families. The initiative spanned all ages including children and young people. The aim of the panel and the accompanying work was to offer the perspectives of citizens on the strategic direction of the new Social Services and Wellbeing (Wales) Bill.

This afforded Participation Cymru an excellent opportunity to put into practice the work they support other organisations to do in terms of effective engagement and enabling citizens' voices to influence policy and service. The year saw over 30 people involved in setting the direction of travel for Social Services in Wales. There were many challenges and the PC team learned a lot from members of the panel who came from many different walks of life and faced a variety of difficulties. The work was evaluated and recommendations for similar work in the future agreed.

As Participation Cymru reflects on this work, we can see that the National Principles for Public Engagement were invaluable in the planning, running and evaluation of the panel. A considerable amount was learned in terms of accessibility of materials, enabling and empowering people to take part effectively and in assuring that a difference was made.

One of the team members, Dyfrig Williams, who worked on the panel reflected in a blog, 'I've really enjoyed the practical work we've done with citizens around Wales. I've met so many committed people who have been more than ready to give their time to try and make public services and society in general better. It's for this reason that the most memorable piece of work I've been part of has been the Citizens' Panel for Social Services in Wales.'

Co-production and public services

The third sector can play a critical role in improving public services, especially at a time when resources are shrinking, but demand and expectations are increasing.


We have continued to highlight the importance of Welsh Government working with the sector to co-produce public services, based on four essential pillars:

- Engaging individuals and communities in identifying need or working together to meet those challenges
- Prevention and early intervention
- Seeking alternative and better models of delivery
- Scrutiny

This co-production or sharing of responsibility, power and resource recognises more accurately how we actually live our lives. It meets our needs to live in safe, healthy and prosperous and attractive places and accords with our understanding that quality of life is determined by a mix of individual, family, community and state action in which the former will often be the most important.

This year we have worked to put these ideas into practice:

- Through our Wales Wellbeing Bond, we are working with Cwm Taf Local Health Board, Interlink and Voluntary Action Merthyr Tydfil to invest in a new initiative to support a third sector mental health intervention strategy aimed at reducing spending on prescribed drugs.
- In partnership with the health and social care Alliance of Alliances (including Age Alliance Wales, Cymorth Cymru. Wales Alliance for Citizen Directed Support, Wales Alliance for Mental Health, Wales



Association of County Voluntary Councils, Wales Carers Alliance and Wales Disability Reference Group) we are working to ensure that the Welsh Government's National Outcomes Framework for social services is created though a national wide-scale discussion with people facilitated by WCVA and the members of all the Alliances.



Building National Outcomes in Wales through a discussion with people

At the heart of the Social Services and Wellbeing Wales Bill is a commitment to a national statement of outcomes for social care services in Wales. Together with a range of national alliances with an interest in social care and health, we committed to support the Assembly in building this statement on basis of what matters to people. We launched I Matter, We Matter to build and support this national conversation. This conversation was built around two questions:

- What things are important to you in your life?
- What helps you to do these things?

People involved with over 30 organisations and groups offered 2,735 answers to these questions. In February 2013, these organisations facilitated a large workshop involving 53 people to create a shared set of 'We Matter' statements which expressed the things that we all share in common. These statements have been used to shape the Welsh Assembly's national statement on outcomes.

This year we have:

- Represented the third sector on the Welsh Government's Climate Change Commission on sector engagement and support.
- Supported a new Third Sector Partnership Council workstream, committing TSPC members to take action on climate change.
- Set up a dedicated webpage on the new WCVA website which includes resources for the sector on climate change.
- Provided a suite of 12 information sheets on climate change, the implications for the third sector, and how organisations can address the causes and effects.
- Through Environment Wales, invested grant aid of over £696,000 as 178 grants to community-led sustainable development projects, involving over 8,000 volunteers.
- Also through Environment Wales, managed the Supporting Sustainable Living Grant Scheme funded by the Welsh Government which provided more than £250,000 for 22 projects encouraging behavioural change in response to Climate Change.
- Secured and dispersed £131,216 in grant funds to 42 Wales Africa Community Link organisations and projects.
- Worked with a coalition of organisations to influence the shape of the Future Generations Bill.



Climate change and sustainable development

Our work with the third sector Climate Change Leadership Group has continued to focus on how organisations can take practical action to play their part in addressing the causes and effects of climate change. As the administrative partner for Environment Wales we have provided both advice and funding to community projects that improve the environment and address climate change throughout Wales.



The Wales Africa Community Links Clean Energy Grants programme secured and dispersed £45,845 to six projects in Uganda, Kenya, Zanzibar, Ethiopia and Zimbabwe, collectively offsetting 538.9 tonnes of carbon. It also benefits livelihoods, education, health, women's empowerment, nutrition, access to water and food for the African communities involved, and raises awareness of climate change issues through schools and local media in eight Welsh counties.

Fiona Cullen, Volunteer Coordinator of Labata Fantalle Cymru said the Clean Energy grant was helping to irrigate the tree nursery which was in danger of being polluted by chemicals in water running into it from a sugar plantation.

'The grant is fantastic,' she said. 'We've been struggling for years to keep the project site ticking over with small amounts of money, dripfeeding it as and when from local fundraising efforts in Wales as well as

a few regular donations. This is the first injection of money we've had and will hopefully raise awareness of the project and enable the tree nursery to really become established and positively move forward'.

Structural Funds

WCVA's third sector European team (3-SET) provided information, advice and training to third sector organisations seeking to benefit from European Structural Funds.

The focus for 2012-13 was on training third sector project sponsors and contractors in tools for managing an EU funded project; risk management and quality assurance; gaining publicity; measuring soft outcomes and how to tender. The third sector European forum (3-SEF) also facilitated the sharing of information and good practice amongst third sector lead project sponsors.

We have also begun to work with the third sector on preparations for the next round of European Structural and Investment Funds for 2014-2020 through information and awareness raising events, to identify opportunities for third sector delivery of the proposed programme priorities.

This year we have:

- Delivered 15 training courses in all aspects of managing an EU funded project to 174 participants.
- Hosted three events to promote good practice in exit strategies and succession planning, and a State Aid awareness raising session.
- Provided support to third sector EU funded projects during project development and post-award.
- Submitted evidence to the Welsh Government's reflection exercises on the Structural Funds and Rural Development Plan programmes 2007-2013 and the Guilford Review of implementation arrangements.
- Provided written and oral evidence to the National Assembly for Wales' inquiries to scrutinise the Structural Funds programmes in Wales.
- Actively participated in the European Programmes Partnership Forum and WEFO's work streams to prepare for the 2014-2020 programmes.
- Secured wide stakeholder engagement to respond to the Welsh European Funding Office's consultation on the Structural Funds and Rural Development programmes 2014-2020 through events and meetings.



'Our membership of the 3-SEF group (a forum for funded projects) has enabled us to link with other organisations in a similar sector and to share our knowledge and experience of running an ESF funded project. It has also enabled us to stay informed in relation to issues for the sector.'

Feedback has been consistently positive:

'Their knowledge and expertise was indispensible as they were able to professionally guide us through the various processes involved in setting up the project. They were also able to interpret the WEFO guidance, which caused us some confusion early on in the project. We could not have progressed as quickly as we did without the professional support they provided.'

'The bespoke EU project management training which was delivered to our project team was invaluable. The training provided information and guidance specifically for projects funded through the EU which developed the team's knowledge in a key area.'

'We provided evidence (with WCVA) to the NAfW Enterprise & Business Committee on their Inquiry into the Draft Legislative Proposals for the Structural Funds 2014-2020 (Jan 2012). The opportunity to provide this evidence was most valuable and welcome and would not have happened had we not been a part of the 3-SEF group.'

'The WCVA 3-SET team provided impartial advice and guidance. WCVA were able to clear up several queries. We would like to see WCVA given a similar role if there are further European Funding streams in 2014-2020.'

'It is important that the 3rd Sector have a voice around the "Top Table" as all too often the impression is given by officials that the same level of scrutiny is not given to local authorities and other Government agencies.' WCVA Impact report 2012-13 | Grants, loans and contracts
