Notes, letters & correspondence, package:

Listing of mills, including Temple Manor, Westcliffe (in hundred of Hoo) and Woldham.

Correspondence with Tim Tatton-Brown between 1988 – 90 on historical history updates with good feedback on Ebbsfleet, Stonor & Dover. See separate entries below.

Dover – package: Important historical data.

See ‘Annals of Dover’ by John Barrington-Jones, Dover Express, 1916, 2nd Ed. 1938.

T. Tatton-Brown provides other historical data. Very early harbour, east of St Mary’s and St Martin le Grand churches, feeding from the east fork of the River Dour. The east river channel was the later site of the town mill (non-tidal). The west channel had a mill and a silted problem. Herbert, Bishop of Bayeaux built this mill but William the Conqueror banished the Bishop of Bayeaux (Baiaux) and mill reverted to The Crown until modern times. At the entrance to the Harbour there were built a set of lock gates (c. late 1080’s). The land between (in period of ‘Elizabeth I.’) the two river branches, was used for ship building. Locks or sluices were incorporated as well as fortifications to protect the Inner Harbour (Haven), as security of ships was paramount. No modern evidence for any survival but probably at site of early lock gates. The tideway being up the east side of King Street. See early town map.

Does not explain where the tide mill stood! TT-B does not confirm if there ever was one. Will need to ask him?

Ebbsfleet, single page package: Very minor entry recorded.

Extract from Hasted, Vol.4: , , there was a watermill which belonged to the Abbot of Augustines.

The later modern excavation of site for coming of high speed rail line and station was too late.

Gillingham, package: Only became a borough in 1903. Previously, largely under Chatham.

Two watermills recorded. One in ownership of Canterbury Archbishopric, the other to Bishop of Bayeaux.

The Grange, is definitely a watermill site only. No entry for Chatham.

Extracts from ‘Canterbury Tales’ by Chaucer. – may have relevance.

Lyden and Sandwich, package: Modern research by T, Tatton-Brown of area.

Stated to be at TR 349576 – from c.1290 till abandoned by 1326. Damaged by great storm in 1316. The Priory moved the mill to a new site in 1317. See Holt’ p.88-9. Then later damaged by high tides and became non tidal.

Mill taken down and transported by water to Fordwich and re-erected there. See Sandwich entry below.

Milton – (no entry). Mention with Rainham and Upchurch Parishes only, as ‘at least one mill’.

Northfleet – package: An ancient possession of the See of Canterbury.

In operation 1679-80. Sited north of Northfleet Station, of timber framing , later a stucco mill (plaster & lime).

Lost to more present cement works and modern developments.

Extract from London Gazette, Oct 25, 1844. Refers to millers and ship biscuits bakers – Bankruptcy.

Rochester, small package. *Very little generally on various Medway Mills*

Last tidemill on north bank at Strood, (Horsenails Mill). One waterwheel drove 2 pr of stones (one for wheat & other barley). The other waterwheel drove 2 pr of wheat stones, flour dresser, cleaned wheat and actuated sack hoist tackle. Pond quickly silted up and needed frequent scouring and cleaning.

Extract from Reading Mercury, July 21, 1828. Sale notice – ‘Tide watermill with powerful wheel and 3 pair of stones, grinding 80-90 quarters per week.

Sandwich – small package: Extract from ‘Historic Haven’, by Dorethy Gardener FSA, pp.215-6. ‘ There was a mill on the Delf in 1488, run by fresh water. By 1538, salt water drove it, and in 1562 “Mr Adrian” was employed to make a new watermill, on a site chosen by the Mayor and Jurats’. See also Stonor & Ebbsfleet below.

Sittingbourne, small package: Records from 1807 only recorded.

All as paper mills at the Kings Quay site. Several large mill-ponds on which are corn mills and one papermill.

Refer to - 1841 -2 Milton Regis documentation.

Other modern historical information available referring to Milton only /dp.

Stonor and Ebbsfleet, small package:

Extract (source not given). 'In 1266, 2 mills burnt down by the men of the town of Sandwich. Stonor was on one side - Ebbsfleet on the other. In 1365 there was a great storm and inundation in which the town of Stonor was almost destroyed,

Westcliffe (in Cliffe), package and extracts from Kent County Archivist.

Clearly described in lease of 2 Dec 1611, for 30 years from Robert, Earl of Salisbury to William Blake of Cliffe, of a corn mill called a 'tide mill' with wharf and pond in Westcliffe. - - -

In a lease of 1549, two pieces of marsh called 'Myll Hoop' between the mill at Cliffe and the foot of Cliffe Hill and the other in Higham. *Seems there was an earlier mill prior to 1611.*

Pagham & Sidlesham, single page. Sidlesham data only,
The Sidlesham history can be expanded considerably since 1990. See Sidlesham below. No Mill at Pagham?
Seaford , 2 page package. Extract from the Lewes Cartulary, (SRS. 38, pp.178-181.
The causeway to the watermill called Poghemill in Blechington, which mill is now removed (in 1323).
Also 13th C. – Land upon which the pond of the mill at Sefford is established . *Not very clear!*
Selsey. package: Selsey appears to have been an island prior to 16th C. with Pagham Harbour reaching much further west around the lands of Selsey Farm. The harbour and Port of Selsey slowly silted up and was stopped up in 1873.
Extract from ‘Selsey Bill’ plus Plan of Pagham Harbour of 1852.
Extract from, VCH Sussex. 4 – Selsey.mill-pond for a tidal mill mentioned in 1522. Later replaced by a windmill.
Extract from, 1672 map of Island of Selsey. Western coastline has eroded up to two furlongs (1/4 mile) by 1905.
Less at The Bill and east coast. *Very useful historic map.*
Sidlesham, package. Minor notes and extracts for Sidlesham.
Extract of map ‘Survey of Sussex Coast’, dated 1587.
Both Sidlesham and West Wittering mills marked but not Selsey.
Extract of map, ‘Manor of Sidlesham’, dated 1755 from WSRO (Ms. 1990). Large scale, of mill road head and mill pond.

Freshwater (Afton) package:
Extracts and notes, with earliest record of 14th C. (VCH Vol. 5.) Pond and mill gone by 1839.
St Helens package:
Extracts and notes - Probably newly built in 1780, later extended with two water wheels and with double ponds in Bembridge Haven. Mill demolished in 1969 and a house built over foundations. RW, surveyed in 1940.
West Medina package:
Extracts and notes – May have medieval origins attached to Werrar Farm, at head of Dodnor Creek (silted up).
Construction in c.1793, was not completed, never operational, used as barracks by 1799.
Wootton Mill, large package: Notes, extracts and envelope of photographs of this well recorded site.
Dating from c.1132, as the mill of Quarr Abbey. Dam forms road from Newport to Ryde across the pond (Blackbridge Brook). R. Wailes surveyed in 1936.
Photographic survey by Friends of Carisbrooke Castle Museum, prior to demolition in 1962. See photographs. (55 number). *Very good series of b&w photographs.*
Yarmouth, package: Earliest record may go back to “Sea-mills” of 1284. Existing site c.1660. Steam power in use from 1854.
Extract from 1/2500 scale map (sheet XCIII.4) showing mill, pond and rail line.
Note - recording possible mill was not constructed until 1793.

Kingsbridge, Salt Mill – three pages only.

First recorded in deeds of 1679, site a ¼ mile below Dodbrook Quay, (Saltmill Quay) disused by 1740, and mill-pool then filled in..

Plymouth – large package, including photographs.

B&W photo of Millbridge Mills, Stonehouse, – c.1900 (84.5 %) by R. Rugg Monk. Plus map of Plymouth Haven, (Hen VIII). Built across the old Stoke Damerel Fleet in 1525. On a toll bridge. Once had 3 waterwheels and five pair of stones. By 1899, was in ruinous condition; then pond filled in. See map centred on Stonehouse Pool.

Millbay Mill, Town Mill or Sourepole Mill, (at head of bay). Of 13th C. origins; Plymouth corporation controlled by 1564, one of chief sources of income for town, before slowly silting up. Mill ceased work in 1592, then drained and filled in, and building used to house French prisoners in late 1700's. See map centred on The Hoe.

Pomphlett Mill, or Abbot's Mill, Plymstock: Series of good b&w photographs including a map (1756) and plan of Mill, (late 18th C). Part of the manor of Tavistock Abbey until dissolution (1539). Accounts extract for some years between 1392 to 1521. Drawing from J.W. Perkins survey of 1968. Mill demolished in 1969.

Stoke Gabriel Mill, River Dart, small package: - including photographs and map.

Topsham, Fishers Bridge Mill, package: Mill at the head waters of the tidal range on the River Clist (Clyst), off the River Ex. Has only a weir to impound a head of water which was taken off into a small pond behind mill, so largely fresh water over a lunar month. *So tidally restricted.*

Two large size aerial photos (on card), un-dated). See also two maps of Topsham.

Two page, working operation of mill explanation – not dated, nor authors name. *Good explanation of how worked.*

Extract of notes from John Fisher, previous owner of mill, written in 1989. Dating from early 1700's, previously called Marsh Mill. Now owned by his son using electric power only. Wheel and main gearing, removed about 30 years before.

Extract from Express & Echo of July 16, 1982. Article on Fishers Bridge at Topsham with aerial photograph.

Letter from Topsham Museum Society to WM, not dated but c.1970's.

Building survives.

Totnes, Town Mill, three pages:

Reference to page 59, of Percy Russell's, 'The Good Town of Totnes' by Prof. Leonard Elmhirst, at Dartington Hall. Extracts of notes: Dating from 13th century with mill fed from marshland further up the tidal River Dart. At the tidal head, so only partly tidal. From 1581, a new leat from a new river weir constructed, to power 3 grist mills, a 'scheling' mill and 4 fulling mills. Tidal use very reduced and building survives as a museum.

Similar tidal regime to Topsham perhaps?

A number to mills missing from this file - perhaps due to earlier publication of 'Devon & Cornwall' file?
