The Blinkhorns of the Fen Counties.

As I began to collect information about the BLINKHORNs from the British Newspaper Archives it became apparent that the name, originating in Cumberland from Blencarn, had a wider earlier distribution than you would expect from such a limited origin. In Westmorland and Yorkshire today it is usually spelt BLENKHORN (with a frequent variant BLENKIRON amongst the lead miners of North Yorkshire) whilst in Lancashire and everywhere in England south of this the usual spelling is BLINKHORN. Search for the name on Family Search and you are also given LINKHORN which I think we can assume is a derivative of LINCOLN although the place name Linkinhorne in Cornwall ought to be investigated as a possible source. BLINCO or BLINKOW etc is believed to come from Blencow in Cumbria and is quite separate whereas BLINKIN is of uncertain origin and may perhaps have been BLINKHORN and resulted from the lazy pronunciation of their name by people who did not know how to spell it.

Whilst there are earlier traces elsewhere, by the time of the 1841 census BLINKHORN is most often found in Lancashire with a second concentration in the Fen Counties. Thereafter it has once again spread to many other counties. There was clearly a family of Blynkkhorns in Huntingdon by the 1560s and such early versions as BLENKARN continue long after BLINKHORN becomes the most common spelling.

It seemed likely that BLINKHORNS in the Fen Counties could all be related as so many were millers, bakers, millwrights etc. Strangely the other common occupation for their descendants appears to be draper and I cannot quite explain this. I began to collect details from parish register transcripts from Cambs, Hunts and South Lincolnshire together with the National Burial Index (NBI) and store them for ease of reference in spreadsheets.

My great grand father William BLINKHORN was born in Sawtry son of a miller/farmer. He moved to Lincoln where he was draper and hosier and founded a Strict Baptist chapel in Orchard Street. Sir Francis HILL, who wrote a number of books on the history of Lincoln as J W F HILL, was a local solicitor and grandson of William. All my grandparents were born in Lincoln and until recently I knew little about William's ancestry.

THOMAS

If you look for the 4 words – Thomas BLINKHORN Vancouver Island – you will find a number of websites giving biographical details of Thomas as a pioneer farmer. They omit to mention that he was a convict transported to Tasmania in an earlier part of his life and I still have no details as to his whereabouts from 1843 when his certificate of freedom was issued to 1850 when he set sail for Vancouver Island from England with his wife. As he seems to be otherwise of good character it is possible that he arranged to steal the gelding horse belonging to William CHENEY from his farm at Great Gidding and leave it later at a public house where it could be recovered. By this means Thomas would have gained a free passage to Tasmania. William CHENEY would have been the grandfather of Martha CHENEY who later travelled to Vancouver with her Uncle Thomas BLINKHORN. I would be interested to hear from anyone who can prove the often repeated tale that Thomas was a friend of Sir John FRANKLIN who was Lieutenant Governor of Tasmania. It seems to me that this

was Thomas's cover story to avoid mentioning that he had been a convict. He was employed in the vicinity of Launceston first at Scone mill and possibly later at Thorpe mill. Both were watermills. Thomas was my William's eldest half brother. It is often said that he had children but this would be to misunderstand the fact that his father married a second time and the "children" were his half siblings.

SAWTRY

The Sawtry registers for All Saints and St Andrew show more BLINKHORNs. They are the descendants of Joseph BLINKHORN and Mary BATTISON and what at first appears to be a separate family of the descendents of William BLINKHORN and Sarah FRIESBY who married in Yaxley 1739. William was a widower when he married Sarah and after her death went on to marry a further three widows the last outlived him and remarried. This did not explain where Joseph came from but an Elizabeth wife of William buried 1738 must have been William's first wife.

This William's will is dated 1770 and mentions his sons Joseph and William together with granddaughter Mary and Grandson Joseph

There are two legal disputes mentioned on the National Archive website which together identify where the Sawtry BLINKHORNs came from.

The Concise Oxford Dictionary of Place-names gives us the following information re Sawtry. Previous spellings Saltreda etc mean "the landing place of the salt sellers". 1749 "John, Elizabeth and Joseph, 3 children of William BLINKHORN of Saltree, Hunts v MUSGRAVE". This alone does not help but an earlier case 1748 "BLINKHORN v FEAST" gives the ages of the 3 children John 19, Elizabeth 15 and Joseph 18.

EARITH AND BEFORE

Now we can identify two baptisms in Bluntisham John son of William 11 Feb 1729 (he probably married Sarah BRIERS 1746 and their descendants lived at Warboys) and Joseph son of William 17 Jan 1730 but no mention of their sister Elizabeth. Clearly at least one earlier generation also pursued the occupation of miller at Earith and disposal of this mill would have funded the purchase of the mill at Sawtry.

The will of Susan BLINKHORN of Earith is dated 1703. She was widow of a miller and has son William BLINKHORN and daughter Elizabeth BLINKHORN. Also mentioned are "son in law" George BLINKHORN and "daughter in law" Ester HOBB. An "in law" is a relative acquired by marriage so you could have two mothers in law, one if you marry yourself and another if your father remarries. By introducing the term "step" in later years this source of ambiguity was dispensed with. The only parish register entry this clarified was the marriage of Ester BLINKHORN and Thomas HOBBS in Woodwalton 1685/6. At this stage we do not know the name of Susan's husband.

1705 A legal dispute arises between George and his half brother William. George wishes to sell the windmill he has inherited from his father to William and dates when two stage payments are due is established but William fails to make the first payment believing that George does not have full title to the mill. George explains that his younger brother John was entitled to inherit the will from his father Robert provided he made a payment to George of £25 within one year of his father's death. No such payment was received, John has died and his son John (now about 7 years old) therefore has no entitlement to any interest in the mill. George is able to sell the mill and if William still has any doubts offers to cancel the arrangement to sell provided that William pays him an estimate of average

profits on the business since the date of the original agreement. It is not now known what William decided to do. The dispute was settled by appeal to William COWPER, recently appointed Keeper of the Great Seal who, it appears was grand uncle of the poet William COWPER whose verses I have several times encountered whilst recording memorial inscriptions in Norfolk.

William son of Robert BLINKHORN baptised 1646 at Sutton and Elizabeth baptised 1655 at Sutton will be children of Robert's last wife Susannah and they would have also been the parents of Robert 1648 - 1663 and Richard 1653 - 1658 also born at Sutton. [It is possible that this paragraph is incorrect see footnote*]

The young John would be the John baptised at Bluntisham 1696 Possibly this John went on to marry Mary KETTLE and is ancestor of the BLINKHORNs of Colne. But were his father John, together with George and Ester born somewhere else in England or were Robert and his first wife(s) careless about having their children baptised?

Robert left an inventory but his will seems not to have survived his death in 1703 and the same can be said of his son John whose inventory has survived but not his will 1704 and neither of them seem to have a burial record.

We are now missing a generation what is the origin of the William whose first children were born in Bluntisham and later children in Sawtry? It would appear that he was son of George and baptised 1693 in Bluntisham. George's wife at the time is not known but may be Dorothy who was later mother of Susannah born in Wentworth 1696. Both George 1709 and his daughter Susannah 1701 died at Witchford whilst Dorothy may possibly be the widow who died 1723 at Haddenham.

George as we have seen was son of Robert and as we progress backwards in time the records are increasingly less complete. I would guess that Robert was baptised Sutton 1619 son of William and Bridget BLINKHORN.

Without the assistance of documents other than parish registers it will be more difficult to determine how the other BLINKHORNs in the Fen Counties are related.

NOT ALL OF THE FENLAND BLINKHORNS ARE NECESSARILY RELATED

There are families at Thorney, Ramsey, Cambridge and Great Shelford which seem not to be related at present.

Apart from James and Rebecca (COOKE) the south Lincolnshire Blinkhorns may have a separate origin. One Thomas BLINKHORN of Spalding famously invented an improved portable pump for the fire fighters of the day which was patented in 1859 and exhibited at agricultural and other shows around the country throughout the 1860s where its efficiency was demonstrated. It became known as "Blinkhorn's Little Wonder"

SUMMARY CHART

Space does not permit the printing of a conventional family tree on pages of this size. The following is a summary designed to show how various branches of the Fenland BLINKHORNs are related, it is designed to be read from the bottom upwards. E.g. The parents of James of Holbeach generation 6 are William and Sarah generation 5. This list shows some of the descendants of (3) George and John,

sons of (2) Robert and his first wife. Full details when known have been posted to a Public Member's Tree on Ancestry.co.uk, which will be amended should that be necessary.

Footnote * Excel spreadsheets allow you to sort on three levels at once but you would not be correct if you thought it was not possible to sort on more than 3 levels. If you want to sort by SURNAME, and within each surname by first name and within each first name by year and within each year by day, then you need to understand that the program sorts in the reverse order to that you might expect. i.e. by year, then first name, then SURNAME. So first sort your database by day. Then by the other three levels. Knowing how this works you can sort on as many levels as you like.

*Footnote. Having discussed this with Ian Kemp who is also a descendant of the Sawtry family I am inclined to agree that if this paragraph is correct then George, John and Esther would have to have been born before 1646 and it follows that they would all have married late in life. It is more likely that Robert and his last wife Susannah had their family after 1670. In which case it appears that none of Robert's children were baptised in a C of E church.

Death is registered in the Axminster Registration District in Devon middle of 1849.

Whilst the 1841 census shows that William was born in Somerset it is not known where and is entirely possible that he is the William, son of William BLINKHORN baptised at Cross St Presbyterian, Manchester 26 May 1772. It would not be surprising if there were to have been a silk mercer's business with branches in London and Manchester.

George BANNISTER 1813 - 1872

In the 1841 census Sawtry mill was run by John BLINKHORN who was to die later that year. His father Thomas died 1828 and had married a second time to Ann HODSON who, according to the newspaper announcement at the time, was a niece of William HODSON

Charles BANNISTER was miller at the Mill Sawtry All Saints, Huntingdonshire from the census of 1851 to the census of 1871. He died 1872.

Charles was born in Gosberton, Lincolnshire about 1813

He had married Elizabeth Hodson SCOTNEY 1848 in Huntingdon (Father William SCOTNEY 1806 - 1849 and mother Mary HODSON 1806 - 1887) Whether Ann HODSON and Mary HODSON were related is not known at present

He died and his widow Elizabeth was miller in 1881 assisted by son William and in 1891 by son George. By 1901 Elizabeth still lived in the parish but was retired and died in 1909.

Nearby on the 1901 census was a corn miller George H BANNISTER son of Charles and Elizabeth and his wife Mary Ann born in Billingborough, Lincolnshire.
